Plan Your Menu

The dangers in other jobs are no less real. Though a child may not be burned or crippled working with garments or polishing gems, they can be exposed to breathing in hazardous amounts of dust, working in dim conditions or with high levels of noise, or around

dangerous chemicals -- all things that can affect a child in the long term.

Child laborers aren't usually found in large factories, but in small shops or doing piece work at home. Larger factories regularly face inspections or their workers are organized into unions that prohibit child labor. Instead, children work in shops that supply goods or pieces to the larger factories.

Learn Some French Words

Did you know that the French language, like English, Spanish, and Italian, comes from Latin? That means you may actually see words that look familiar to you when you encounter the French language. About 113 million people around the world fluently speak French.

One thing you'll notice right away about French words is that their pronunciation can be quite different from the way they are written. This is because French is written as the language was spoken 400-500 years ago. Here are some simple French phrases to get you started, along with pronunciation help.

Learning About Basic Needs A Good Food & Clean Water

I'm not sure whether or not you like to eat all of the food your parents bring to the supper table. Everyone has their favorites (like mashed potatoes!) and their not-so-favorites (how about brussel sprouts?). Still, having good, nourishing food is vital to being a healthy and happy person. Every day at least one person out of every ten in the world go to bed hungry.

Even more important is clean water. You may not think a whole lot about what comes out of your kitchen faucet every day, but it is clean, fresh water that is free from disease. Water is great at carrying diseases, and many children around the world have difficulty getting clean water. They do not have faucets that bring fresh, running water to them, and must draw water from wells or rivers nearby. They are left to drink water that can make them sick, because it carries bacteria that infect their bodies. Every day 14,000 people die because the water they drink is contaminated in some way!

Consider how much food and water are available to you! Let's find out how much water you use every day! Using the chart below. Keep track of how much water you use in one day.


